THE PERSONAL ORDINARIATE OF OUR LADY OF WALSINGHAM

The Apostolic Constitution *Anglicanorum Cætibus* was published by Pope Benedict XVI in November 2009 in response to petitions from a number of Anglican bishops around the world for corporate reunion with the Holy See. It provided for the erection of ordinariates anywhere in the world where groups of Anglicans with their clergy wished to come into full communion with the Holy See ending the schism begun in the 16th century. They retain many elements of their Anglican customs and traditions, their "liturgical, spiritual and pastoral …treasures" which the Apostolic Constitution asks them to share with other Catholics.

The Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham was erected in Britain in January 2011. Subsequently, the Ordinariate of the Chair of St Peter was erected in North America and the Ordinariate of Our Lady of the Southern Cross in Australia. An ordinariate is similar to a diocese and its Ordinary acts vicariously on behalf of the Pope.

This week we find one of the most ancient observances of the Church, the quarterly 'ember days'. They come along roughly every three months, each time being observed on the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday of the same week. They were so well established in Rome by the time of Pope S. Leo the Great in the fifth century, that he thought they dated back to the Apostles. They were first brought to England with the mission of S. Augustine, and have been commemorated here ever since. They appear to have been originally connected with elements of the agricultural year; though this has been superseded by their connection with ordinations. Traditionally men were ordained to the various orders of ministry (up to and including the priesthood) during a long and drawn-out Mass on the Ember Saturday; as such, all three days came to have a focus of fasting and prayer for those to be ordained as well as for vocations.

Please do take some time during these days to pray for the clergy, we rely heavily on the prayers of the faithful; for those young men who have offered themselves for ordination and are preparing and discerning in our seminaries. Pray especially for more vocations to the priesthood – that young men will head the call of the Lord.

ALMIGHTY God, the giver of all good gifts, who of thy divine providence hast appointed divers Orders in thy Church: give thy grace, we humbly beseech thee, to all who are called to any office and ministry for thy people; and so fill them with holiness of life, that they may faithfully serve before thee, to thy glory of thy great Name and for the benefit of thy holy Church.
